One of the lessons of COVID19 is that we are called to see each other with new eyes and a new heart. We have become more aware and appreciative of this reality, namely: our common humanity and our shared dignity made in the image and likeness of God. This dignity calls us to look out for and care for our neighbour especially the poorest of the poor.

A practical expression of this conviction is that our MMC supporters have been able to keep 'giving' during these challenging and demanding times in our country and in our families.

Most of our Marist missionaries are able to continue their day to day work. Projects in the Philippines for Street Boys and Girls at Risk continue to operate under lock down conditions. In Bangladesh, the children with disabilities have great difficulty understanding why they are unable to attend their centre each day. Staff in this centre are maintaining contact with family visits or regular messages.

Schools and parishes in Oceania are open but the economy as a whole is struggling due to a lack of tourism.

Our school in Tonga has undergone a major restoration project following Cyclone Gita with the support of the World Bank and MMC.

Dhaka is one of the most densely populated cities in the world.

Children with disabilities are seen as a source of shame for the family and as a punishment for some wrong doing.

Many women are blamed for their child's disability and abused and rejected by their husband and his family.

The Centre is a safe place where the mothers and children are accepted and supported.

Some disadvantaged young women are employed to live at the home and to assist with activities.

The Centre is conducted by the SMSM Sisters. Sr Julienne writes that 'our priority is to help the children to feel happy and loved while also carrying out development activities'.

The staff have been busy keeping in touch with students and families during lock-down.

This has been a blessing for everyone during COVID 19.

This program provides a place of joy, helping young people to develop to their full potential. Most of the children have intellectual and physical disabilities and can take part in some form of play.

Each mother or guardian is taught how to do simple exercises and massage on their child at home. The children are learning basic life skills and ways of communicating with others.

There are 21 children regularly attending the Centre with a parent or guardian.

## EDUCATION — A GIFT OF HOPE



#### **Marist Solidarity Cambodia**

More than half a million people live with a disability in Cambodia. They face experiences that 'disable' them from participating fully and equally in community life.

The greatest impediments in the lives of young people with disabilities are prejudice, social isolation and discrimination.

This is even more so for young girls. These young people have limited access to appropriate treatment, rehabilitation services and skills and vocational training.



This program conducted by the Marist Brothers is known as: the 'Inclusive Education Program for Secondary and University Students'.

It is for students who would have no chance of accessing education if living at home. Education opens the way to a future with hope.





There are 75 High School students and 13 University students who are provided with hostel care, guidance, medical care, essential school supplies and rehabilitation services.

These students have the same basic right to education, employment, social participation and self-determination as their non-disabled peers.

They are now looking forward to employment, housing and community integration.
