

Bangladesh: Anondo Neer-Dakar

When lasmine's daughter Sangita was born she was found to be severely disabled, her husband blamed lasmine and beat her. To save her life and the life of her daughter, she left her husband and found her way to the safety of Anondo Neer.

Here she was able to watch and learn from a volunteer physiotherapist how to give exercises to her daughter. The Physiotherapist noticed lasmine's hands on skills with her daughter and other children and encouraged her to develop her gift.

lasmine has now completed a Certificate of Competence as a Physiotherapist Aide and during Covid times with the Centre closed has been going to the homes of the disabled to continue their therapy.

Philippines: Balay Banaag—Davao City

Balay Banaag is a Centre conducted by the Marist Sisters for young girls who are at risk of exploitation and abuse because of the poverty and disadvantage of their mother's situation in life.

The girls live in a safe place and learn about self-care, human rights and dignity. This young girl has spent a day session with her class mates and the Social Worker enjoying activities. She is now beginning to trust herself and others.

Rome: Our Marist Future

Our Marist seminarians from various parts of the world now complete their studies for the priesthood in Rome.

This enables them to strengthen their sense of Marist identity for mission.

Thailand: Marist Asia Foundation - Ranong

The country of Myanmar has experienced many years of tension and conflict and in recent months a military coup. The division and suffering of families in the country and between ethnic groups has caused many families to become refugees in the border city of Ranong in Thailand.

Marist Asia Foundation was established by the Marist Fathers as an outreach to this refugee community in Ranong. There are two sections of this ministry – a HIV/AIDS Health program and an educational program.

Ranong is a major fishing port where international fishing companies exploit Burmese migrants working on fishing boats in harsh conditions over long periods at sea. The men often use drugs and share needles to cope and as a result develop HIV/AIDS. On return to port, they pass the virus onto their wives.

The MAF Health Team conducts family visits to provide HIV Testing & Support, health education, counselling, medical support, nutrition and especially care and compassion.

Last year the team conducted 1017 home visits and trained 4 local leaders as Support Workers.

Glenn & Sue Roff from Australia have just completed 12 months as volunteers at the Centre in Ranong supporting the education of young Burmese refugees.

Both are retired teachers with a wealth of experience in teaching and school leadership.

At the beginning of their time they were faced with the challenges of Covid and at the end of their year they walked with these same students whose people experienced the drama of a coup in their home country.

Glenn & Sue helped students complete courses from Australian Catholic University in a 'Diploma of Liberal Arts' and a 'Certificate in Teaching & Learning'.
