#### **TESTIMONY**

My name is Anna Maria, I am 65 years old, and I live in Marconia di Pisticci (Matera), in a condominium apartment with many architectural obstacles. When I was 26, I was diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis. As this is an autoimmune disease, over the years I have developed many illnesses and I have had to undergo several surgeries. The last one, 13 years ago, consigned me to a wheelchair. Since my parents died, I live alone. I need someone to help me for my various needs. Dealing with all this hasn't been at all easy. The physical pain, the plans for my life wiped out, the impossibility of working, the lack of acceptance, have made me experience a real death, that of the soul. But "God on the mountain provides." I thank the Lord for consecrated people - especially the Marist Fathers - and the laity who comfort me with the grace of the sacraments (Confession and Communion) and weekly prayers. Thanks to this I feel I can say with certainty that only when I let Christ into my life, into my pain, can I sing with the psalmist: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want..."
